
TEAM SELECTION PROCEDURES UPDATE

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Where Olympic Journeys Begin

INTRO

USA Climbing' priority for the last two IFSC World Cups, the PanAm COQE in Santiago (Pan American Games), and during the Olympic Qualifying Series (OQS) the first six months of 2024 is maximizing the potential for US Olympic qualification. The Team Selection Procedures doc updates are to support and incentivize that primary USA Climbing goal.

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NCH Eligibility

The 2023 NCH Eligibility criteria are somewhat altered from those used for the 2022 NCH. The Collegiate National Team Ranking eligibility is extended to top-6 (from top-3) to match that of Youth National Team Ranking eligibility for NCH. (Read section 3.2.3)



NCH Eligibility

The Lead and Boulder "cross-eligibility" criteria (those achieving eligibility for Boulder being automatically eligible for Lead, and viceversa) is going to be more limited than for the 2022 NCH eligibility. While 2023 NCH cross-eligibility remains as it was for 2022 NCH, the 2024 (and beyond) NCH cross-eligibility is limited to: (Read section 3.2.3)

- Team Pre-select and Recent Team members (and Olympic)
- NCH Eligibility Ranking top-25 (not all top-100 eligible for individual Lead or Boulder)
- Youth and Collegiate top-3 (not all top-6 eligible for individual Lead or Boulder)

NTT Eligibility

2024 NTT eligibility based on NCH performance is now restricted to only those ranked in the top-40 at the 2023 NCH, whereas eligibility at prior NTTs may have extended beyond top-40 if there were more than 60 competitors at the corresponding NCH. (Read section 4.2.1)

Paraclimbing Team Preselected

Criteria for a Paraclimbing being designated Team Preselected has been established. (Read section 7.2.1)

Team Selection Discretion

Team Selection Discretion has been updated to provide for proposals submitted by the USA Climbing AAC (as well as the USA Climbing High Performance staff as before). The approval and communication processes, as well as the scope, have been updated.



Team Selection Discretion

1.6 General - USA Climbing Team Selection Discretion

- 1.6.1 USA Climbing Team Selection Discretion provides the authority to waive or amend rules in this document, subject to the following:
 - a) The USA Climbing High Performance team (or equivalent) or USA Climbing Athletes' Advisory Committee must submit a written proposal to the USA Climbing Team Selection Committee outlining:
 - i) the requested discretion; and
 - ii) the justification for the discretion, based, in part, on performance at recent USA Climbing, IFSC, or NACS competitions; and
 - iii) any precedents relevant to the discretion; and
 - iv) the anticipated impact of such discretion.
 - The proposal should be communicated to all affected athletes in a timely manner.
 - c) The USA Climbing Team Selection Committee and the USA Climbing CEO must both approve the proposal for the discretion to be granted.
 - d) The USA Climbing Board of Directors must be informed within fourteen (14) days of any exercise of discretion, by way of submission of the proposal and the Team Selection Committee recommendation/approval to the board.



Speed Considerations

For the Elite series Speed Discipline, and if USA Climbing quota remains after all National Team and National Development Team athletes are given the opportunity for a competition start, US Citizen athletes who have achieved the Competition Start minimum benchmark time may be awarded a Competition Start. (Read section 2.3.4 c)

Speed Benchmark times for the National Team, Competition Starts and NTT eligibility have been updated. (Read section 2.4)



Speed Considerations

2.4 Elite: Speed Benchmarks

- 2.4.1 USA Climbing Team Selection Speed Benchmark times are established at the conclusion of the calendar year, using the times achieved that year in the Speed Qualification rounds of IFSC World Cups and, if held that year, the IFSC World Championship.
- 2.4.2 The Speed Benchmark times to be established as follows:
 - a) The National Team Benchmark (NT Benchmark) is determined at the conclusion of the calendar year by:
 - for each World Cup (and where relevant, the World Championship) in that calendar year:
 - A) for each competitor with a valid Qualification round time (without a False Start), determining that competitor's fastest valid Qualification round time; and
 - B) determining the competition median value of those fastest Qualification round times in the competition; and then
 - ii) determining the median value among those competition median values.
 - The Competition Start Benchmark (CS Benchmark) is determined by multiplying the National Team Benchmark by 1.07 (an increase of 7%).
 - The NTT Eligibility Benchmark (NTT Benchmark) is determined by multiplying the National Team Benchmark by 1.40 (an increase of 40%).
 - d) Each Speed Benchmark calculation (median of Qualification times, NT benchmark, CS benchmark, NTT benchmark) is rounded up to two (2) decimal digits (1/100th of a second) before being presented or used further. (e.g., 8.251 rounds up to 8.26)
 - For the avoidance of doubt, an athlete must achieve benchmark times using their timingsystem-displayed time without rounding. (e.g., a race time of 6.201 does not meet a 6.20 benchmark time.)

e) Subject the above, the 2024 Speed Benchmark times are (estimated to be):

Note that these Benchmark times are estimates and subject to change once the final Speed World Cup (Wujiang 22-24 Sept) has concluded.




CUWR Bonus Points

Same as before. See 2.1.5(a)

- 2.1.5 National Team Ranking Bonus points are as follows:
 - a) At the conclusion of the National Championship, IFSC CUWR Top-40 National Team Ranking Bonus points are awarded in each of the Lead, Boulder, and Speed Disciplines, where their points are determined from their CUWR top-40 rank in the Discipline using the table below:

USA Climbing has established National Team Ranking Bonus points and NTT eligibility for athletes who qualify for the Continental Olympic Qualification Event (COQE) and/or the OQS, in lieu of such athletes competing at the NCH event. Such consideration is towards USA Climbing's goal of maximizing the opportunity and probability of filling the US Olympic quota. (Read section 2.1.5 b)



 Olympic Qualification Process National Team Ranking Bonus points are awarded to select athletes who do not compete at the 2023 NCH, as follows.

 iv) At the conclusion of the COQE, athletes who competed at COQE and did not compete at NCH

are awarded Ranking Bonus points that are the sum of four-hundred (400) points plus sixty percent (60%) of the points in Table 2-7 above using their COQE rank.

- A) Speed Ranking Bonus points use the Speed COQE rank.
- B) Lead and Boulder Ranking Bonus points use the Boulder & Lead COQE rank.

For the avoidance of doubt, the purpose of these bonus points is to incentivize focus on the COQE by the athletes eligible to compete there. That event is part of the Olympic qualification pathway; even if the US Olympic quota of two (2) is filled at WCH, representation at the PanAm Games by top athletes is of high importance to USA Climbing.

In 2023, the NCH is less than two (2) weeks before the COQE, and USA Climbing desires to incentivize the relevant athletes to prepare for the COQE without the distraction of the NCH's place in the pathway to 2024 World Cup Competition Starts. In effect, these bonus points provide a means for relevant athletes to treat the COQE as a substitute for NCH – depending on the results of the remainder of 2023, such athletes would still be able to attend the NTT with some measure of NTR points.



 At the conclusion of the COQE, and only if US Olympic NF quota was not filled upon the conclusion of the WCH, athletes who did not compete at COQE and did not compete at NCH,

if they are among one of the top four (4) ranked US athletes within the set of:

- A) for Lead and Boulder, the top forty-eight (48) ranked world athletes in the Boulder & Lead CUWR not (yet) qualified for the Olympics; or
- B) for Speed, the top thirty-two (32) ranked world athletes in the Speed CUWR not (yet) qualified for the Olympics,

are awarded four-hundred fifty (450) Ranking Bonus points.

For the avoidance of doubt, the purpose of these points is to incentivize an athlete who, after NCH, is a reasonable likely candidate for OQS but is not eligible for COQE, to focus on the remaining WCs during the four weeks before NCH. This incentive:

- Recognizes that COQE NF quota is 3 while OQS quota is 4.
- Is not present in the case of the US filling Olympic quota at WCH (if the US does fill Olympic quota at WCH, an athlete has time to prepare for the NCH).
- Is only available to those within the nominal range of CUWR ranking that are assured of OQS eligibility, subject to NF eligibility.
- Is only available to up to one athlete per Discipline.



Elite Competition Starts are subject to having the first allocated competition start for each event being subject to Team Selection Discretion. This can result in an athlete who is not on the relevant National Team receiving a competition start ahead of an athlete who is on the National Team. (Read section 2.3.3)

For the 2024 World Cup season, Competition Start allocation will prioritize Olympic Team members, both before and after the Olympics. Athletes who have qualified for the Olympic Qualification Series (OQS) will have priority until the end of the OQS. (Read section 2.2.1 c, and then 2.3)

This is accomplished by naming all OQS competitors to the National Team until the end of the OQS. At that time, those otherwise qualified for the National Team will remain on the National Team, but other OQS competitors will move from the National Team to the National Development Team. All athletes on the National Development Team are subject to Competition Start priority/order based on Team Selection Discretion based on a proposal from USA Climbing High Performance staff or AAC.



2.2 Elite: National Team & National Development Team Selection

Notes: Because the IFSC quota allocated to the US may be fewer than the number of National Team members, not all National Team members are guaranteed a Competition Start.

The National Team may include Preselected plus the top "N" from National Team Rankings (NTR).

c) 2024: In each of the Lead and Boulder Disciplines:

Q: Does an athlete get to choose between Olympic Pathway bonus points and NCH points?

A: No, if an athlete participates at the NCH, they are not eligible for the Olympic Pathway bonus points. (However, they would still be eligible for CUWR bonus points, just like last year)

Q: How were the bonus point values chosen?

A: USA Climbing believes that the athletes receiving these points would stand a reasonable chance of a high ranking at NCH, and the purpose of the bonus points is to incentivize select athletes to focus on the Olympic qualification pathway. The attempt to align such interests is clearly not precise given the dynamic nature of the sport and the differences from event to event, but represents USA Climbing's attempt to be fair to all.



Q: Does this mean that the NCH+NTT pathway for "team" may not result in any Competition starts?

A: Competition Starts for WCs held prior to the end of the OQS will prioritize Preselected and OQS selected athletes. As such, the top 2 National Team Ranking athletes on the National Team may have limited access to Competition Starts during this time.

US Projected IFSC Quota for 2024 as determined by the IFSC policy:

- Boulder Men (5) Lead Men (5) Speed Men (5)

- Boulder Women (3) Lead Women (5) Speed Women (4)
